What Happened at Assembly?

Bloomington United, March 29, 2014 A report from Presbytery of Ohio Valley

Carol McDonald led our worship by preaching in the morning and celebrating the sacrament of the Lord's Supper in the close of the day. Carol is our retiring Synod Executive. As a part of her retirement process she has been visiting each presbytery in the Synod. One of her life long forms of ministry has been a commitment to Camp and Conference ministry. POV presented her with a scholarship in her honor for a camper at Pyoca for the next five years.

Hospitality from United Presbyterian was wonderful as always. The new interim pastor, Mitch Coggin, welcomed us to United.

Olivet Administrative Commission reported a proposed settlement of the lawsuit that has gone on for several years. The settlement was approved, but later in the meeting needed to be opened again as business. A final negotiation of a precise dollar number was assigned to a commission named in the meeting. This matter should be complete and settled by the next Assembly.

PYOCA the new acting director of Pyoca reported. He is Mike Davis. Mike reported on current and projected activity at the camp. He was welcomed, for his first meeting at POV.

Administrative Commission at Charlestown was appointed by Council and reported to the Assembly. This is the second AC in the last two years. The provision of the appointment centered on conflict in the congregation and the inability of the session to manage the situation. This administrative commission will for a period simply act as and for the session of the church.

Reports from Committees and Officers of the presbytery. The normal reports and information of commission and committees were offered. As usual, the Treasurer report included per capita and mission giving.

Letter from the Pastor



"He is not here, He is risen" was the familiar refrain that greeted the first visitors to the tomb that Easter morning. Those words also began our Easter 2014 as the trumpet, piano and organ called us to a Celebration of the Resurrection. All our weeks trudging through the agony of the cross — our own crosses and the ultimate one on which Jesus suffered and died, were overcome by Jesus' resurrection. Easter is not a one-day occurrence! What happened on that day should influence our lives in every way, every day!

Profound thanks are in order for the dedication, prayers and hard work of everyone at UPC during the Lenten season. Thanks to all who planned and participated, baked, attended book and Bible studies, sang and played, handed out crosses, Lenten tokens and bulletins, led Lenten devotionals, lit candles and contributed jars to be broken.

All together, we celebrated the resurrection. We once again proved that we are the family of God and that we belong to one another – just as we belong to God.

Now our focus turns again toward the weeks following Easter (leading to Pentecost) and again to the interim process. Perhaps you remember my previous description of a few of the steps in the interim process. They include (among many others), *accessing the organizational structure within UPC to ascertain what we are doing well as well as what we aren't doing so well. What are the mission endeavors of our church about which we feel passionately and which ones no longer serve us well? How are we doing financially, reporting our receipts and expenditures and being good stewards of the resources with which God has blessed us? What part of our history do we need to embrace and celebrate and what part of our history needs to be buried, forgiven and forgotten?

During the coming months we will begin working on a Mission Study. This will be an exciting process of discovery, celebration, assessment, clarification and visioning. This multi-step process will allow us to focus on who we are as a people, who God is calling us to be as a family of faith, who is our neighbor and how can we best serve our neighborhood? The Mission Study will allow us to look at the demographics of our church and community and survey UPC on the type leader that the church is feeling led to call as the next pastor. The months ahead are critical in helping us to clarify our identity, who we are becoming and who we can become in the years ahead with the help of God. Your prayers and participation are essential as we move into these exciting days of discovery.

In this edition of Reaching UP, we offer one of the first tools that will enable us to diagnose the mission endeavors of our church. Included will be a link to an online survey that I want to encourage you to complete. It will ask your perception of the mission work we have done in recent years. How did those missions come to be supported by UPC? Who were some of the first providers/supporters of those missions? What missions must we continue to invest time, talent and treasure? Your completion of this survey is an essential first step.

Finally in the coming weeks, I will teach a study prior to church on 3 Sunday mornings in May. What Do Presbyterians Believe, What Does It Mean To Be a Presbyterian and How Do You Become a Member of a Presbyterian Church will highlight our discussion on Sunday, May 4, 11 and 18 at 9:00 A.M. Bring your questions and your interest and learn as I lead us. In all you do, always remember, "He is not here, He is risen, indeed!"


UPC's Game Day




UPC held it's first game day on April 12th, 2014. The beautiful weather and busy spring schedules caused the turn out to be small.

Dr Allan Boesak to deliver Laws Lecture in Columbus

Dr. Allan Boesak of South Africa, prominent anti-apartheid activist, theologian and first African president of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches (WARC), will give the William R. Laws Peacemaking Lecture on Saturday, May 3, 2014 at North Christian Church, 850 Tipton Lane, Columbus, IN. The lecture will be at 4:00 p.m., followed by questions and a reception. This lecture is free and open to the public.

Currently the Desmond Tutu Chair of Global Peace, Justice, and Reconciliation Studies for Butler University and Christian Theological Seminary in Indianapolis, Dr. Boesak worked closely with Archbishop Tutu and Nelson Mandela as a leader in the peaceful transition of power with the ending of racial apartheid in South Africa.

Dr. Boesak has served South African churches and the worldwide ecumenical movement in numerous senior capacities, including as the youngest person ever elected to lead Presbyterian and Reformed churches worldwide as President of WARC. Among his many awards are the Robert Kennedy Human Rights Award and the Martin Luther King Jr. Peace Award.

The Laws Lectures honor Rev. Laws, who served as the Moderator of the national Presbyterian Church during the turbulent time of 1970. He was a civil rights leader, youth advocate, peacemaker, and the beloved pastor of the First Presbyterian Church in Columbus, Indiana.

The international stature of Dr. Boesak and the legacy of Rev. Laws have inspired over twenty organizations to join First Presbyterian in sponsoring this event.

Financial Report

We came out just below the break-even point in March. We took in a total of \$14,392.80 for the month and our expenses were \$15,011.06, giving us a negative cash flow of \$618.26 for March and a positive cash flow of \$3,647.34 for the year-to-date.
