Update from Nyaka

Just a few years ago (2003), David Bremer responded to a letter from Twesigye Jackson Kaguri asking churches to support his effort to start a primary school for AIDS orphans in his home village of Nyakagezi in Uganda, Africa. He would make sure they were educated in the basics, make sure they were fed, and clothed, as well as taught trade and farming skills to help their families. My how things have grown! There are now 2 primary schools and a new secondary boarding school that opened this year. Libraries are available at all schools with solar power and access to the internet. The original school enrollment of 30 students has grown to 692 in the three schools combined. The students continue to obtain some of the highest scores on the national exams. The very first students that attended Nyaka in P1 are heading off to college or trade school this year. The students are not the only ones affected. The granny program has built houses and taught them skills to sustain their families through selling products that they have made or farmed on land provided by the Nyaka AIDS Orphans Project. Medical and dental needs are fulfilled through clinics and home visits by local doctors and nurses as well as a visiting health care program. Our own Fuad Haddad hopes to intern this summer.

Jackson's dream has become reality! It all started with the support of individuals like you. He has a full time job now looking for large grants to build and support the infrastructure of the school's efforts as well as continuing to reach out to individuals who are always important in its success. Every dollar is appreciated and put to work. You can sponsor a student for \$250 annually with an additional \$125 to cover administrative costs. Your base \$250 donation will go 100% to pay for a child's education and you will get to correspond with that individual. Financial Report

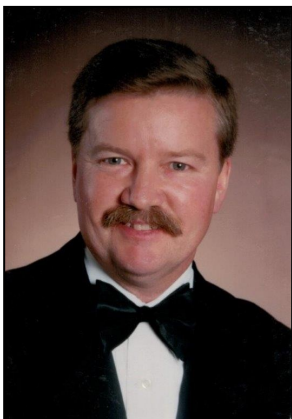
Donations were down significantly in March, offsetting a comfortable margin from the first two months. We took in a total of \$7,563.72 for the month and our expenses were \$13,557.87, giving us a negative cash flow of \$5,994.15 for March and a positive cash flow of \$172.97 for the year to date.

Last month we reported that \$341.68 had been raised for Monroe County United Ministries during the Souper Bowl collection this year. It has come to light that there were additional checks made out directly to MCUM and other organizations fighting hunger locally. This has raised the total from the Souper Bowl collection to \$491.68

If you attended the annual meeting, you may remember that we had received an attractive offer to purchase a small parcel of undeveloped property that the church has owned for over 100 years. The transaction has been completed and we now have \$15,000 added to our reserves. We owe a debt of gratitude to Donald Griffin of Griffin Realty for working without commission to assist us in negotiating the deal.

In Memoriam

Louis Paul Tompkins
December 18, 1952 – April 15, 2015

Louis Paul Tompkins, 62, of Bloomington, lovingly known to us all as “Lou,” passed away at 8:23 p.m. on Wednesday, April 15, 2015 at Kindred Hospital Indianapolis South in Indianapolis, Indiana. He was born December 18, 1952, in Indianapolis, IN, to Zelmar and Lenora (Higgs) Tompkins. Louis was a 1970 graduate of Ellettsville High School, and attended Indiana University. He was a U.S. Navy Veteran enlisting in 1974 serving 6 years in submarine service honorably discharged in 1980. Louis worked at Crane Naval Service Warfare Center for 16 years, retiring in 1997.

He was a member of United Presbyterian Church, Masonic Monroe Lodge #22 and Shriners International, an avid IU football fan, loved model ships and photography. Lou was a long-time active member of United Presbyterian when he left for Iraq as a civilian to work for the United States Military. After his injuries due to enemy military action in 2004, which left him wheelchair bound, Lou maintained his relationship with the church. He is survived by his daughter; Elizabeth Angela Tompkins of Bloomington, his mother; Lenora Anne Tompkins, three brothers; Thomas, Timothy, and David Tompkins, one sister; Sharon Nejfelt. Louis is preceded in death by his father

Funeral Services were held in Bloomington on Sunday, April 19, 2015 at 3:00 p.m. at Allen Funeral Home with Rev. Mitchell J. Coggin officiating. Visitation was from 1:00 p.m. to service time. The service was attended by friends and relatives as well as many members of United Presbyterian, numerous veterans from the various branches of the United States Military as well as members of the Masons and Shriners. After the eulogy and prayer, the American Flag-draped coffin followed by the assemblage was led outdoors to bagpipes playing *Amazing Grace*. Once outdoors, members of the military performed a traditional Twenty One Gun Salute which was followed by a trumpet performance of *Taps*. The American Flag was then ceremoniously removed from the coffin, properly folded and presented to daughter Elizabeth Angela Tompkins. Cremation rites will be accorded.
