Pastor's Pen



I recently sat in a circle with 9 adults. All were over 40 and roughly half surpassed the 70 age range. Compare that to another group in which I recently participated. That group of 5 included a majority that were under 50. Both were church groups (different congregations) with churches that boast of more than 175 years in each of their histories. Both groups of adults, in vastly different communities, are in a pastoral search. In fact, off the top of my head, I can think of 17 Presbyterian congregations within 90 miles of here that are currently in the pastoral search process. That represents at least a third of the congregations within the Presbytery of Ohio Valley! That isn't to imply that turnover is the norm in most of those congregations. Several of those churches, prior to their current search, can boast of long-tenured pastorates of greater than 10 years each. The law of averages finally created turnover within a Presbytery within a short period of time.

In addition to a pastoral search, most of our congregations share additional similarities. Most are looking seriously at budget shortfalls, declining membership and whether their future will allow many of those congregations to continue with a full-time pastoral arrangement. Fortunately that isn't the case with United Presbyterian. While indeed, our membership has waned over the last several years, like most congregations, we still enjoy a relatively healthy financial standing and the Pastor Nominating Committee is conducting their search for full-time leadership. That does not mean that we can be frivolous with our resources, but it does mean that we have been and are blessed by God to live/work/worship within a growing, thriving, community that is always changing. That presents us with several challenges for mission and ministry within our neighborhood.

- 1) We must continue to provide music, Bible studies, and worship that lifts God in praise. There can be no substitute for putting God first in all that we do/say and/or sing.
- 2) We must continue to reach out in care and concern for those who come and for those who cannot. This means that we care for new persons as unique individuals and provide hospitality and welcome for all.
- 3) We must continue to use our building as a resource for a community that offers programs, support groups and meetings that benefit a critical mass (some we will never meet or see personally but who are impacted by the environment we can provide).
- 4) We must continue to stretch ourselves to grow and to be challenged to offer ministry in fresh, new ways that attract new people, welcome back people who have drifted away and provide spiritual nourishment to all.

All the above are within our grasp. These ideas encourage us to continue to do well the things that we do well (music, worship, hospitality and care of one another) and strive more diligently to welcome others who come. Reach out to neighbors and persons we may not have previously considered inviting to church. UPC is in a good place and each of you are vital to the future of this church.

How will you support us as we move into a bright and exciting future?

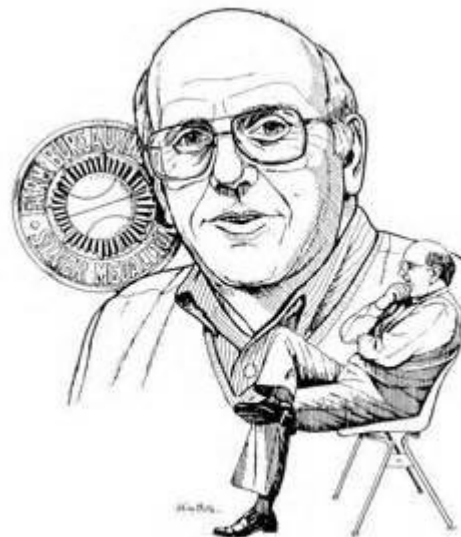

Recognizing Bob Hammel

UPC has been the proud home of Bob Hammel for many reasons unrelated to IU and sports. But, let's take a moment and share in the amazing honor that was granted to him a little earlier this year. Bob Hammel was inducted into the Monroe County Sports Hall of Fame. The brief bio given was full of amazing triumphs.

"In newspaper profession (1954) 50 years, 30 at Herald-Times Bloomington; covered IU's NCAA championships, 8 IU bowl games, including 1968 Rose Bowl; 23 NCAA Final Fours, 5 Olympic Games, 8 World Series, 10 Indianapolis 500s, 29 Ind. high school basketball championship games and one heavyweight championship fight, Muhammad Ali vs. Michael Spinks (1978)... Member of U.S. Basketball Writers Assoc. Hall of Fame, Ind. Basketball Hall of Fame, Ind. Journalism Hall of Fame, Indiana Athletics Hall of Fame, Indiana Sportswriter and Sportscasters Hall of Fame; Sagamore of Wabash Award; Curt Gowdy Award (International Basketball Hall of Fame); Ind. Basketball Hall of Fame Silver Medalist; Bert McGrane Award for lifetime contributions to Football Writers Assoc of America; Fred Russell Award for lifetime contributions to All-American Football Foundation; National Sportscasters and Sportswriters Assoc. Sportswriter of the Year (17 times); Ind. Sportswriters and Sportscasters Assoc. Writer of the Year (4 times)."

In Memoriam

Edward Hearne Hitchcock

June 5, 1941 – July 31, 2015

Edward “Ned” Hearne Hitchcock passed away after a brief illness in Bloomington, Indiana less than a month after his 74th birthday. He is survived by his sons, Edward Cady Hitchcock, (married to Kimberly, grandchildren Lila and Edward) and John Harrison Hitchcock (married to Christine, grandchildren Zachary and Abigail), and brother, Nicholas Fithian Hitchcock.

Edward was married to Frances Cady Hitchcock in Swarthmore, PA in 1966. Frances passed away in New York in 1998. He was born in Philadelphia on June 5, 1941 to Edward Dickey Hitchcock and Florence Hearne Hitchcock. He spent most of his youth living near Philadelphia. Edward graduated from Swarthmore College in 1964 and received his Master’s in Social Work from Bryn Mawr College in 1968.

Edward was a social worker in New York for 30 years. He was active in the Boy Scouts of America with Troop 240 in Riverdale, NY. He moved to Knoxville, TN in 1999 and continued to work as a social worker until his retirement. He spent a few years living in Athens, OH and then moved to Bloomington.

Known to his many friends in Bloomington as Ed, he was active in his church and, at the time of his death, was a Bloomington United Presbyterian Church Deacon, an alternate to the Pastor Nominating Committee, a participant in both the Tuesday Midday Bible Study and Tuesday Evening Book Study, regular attendee at the Sunday Morning Pastor’s Class and was a member of the annual UPC Ethnic Food Fair Committee. He was also active with the Bloomington Interfaith Winter Homeless Shelter, Alcoholics Anonymous. He simply loved helping others. He was an avid reader and also enjoyed woodcarving, gardening and volunteering.

More than 70 mourners gathered as The Reverend Mitchell J. Coggin, United Presbyterian Church Interim Pastor, officiated at the Saturday, August 8 memorial service in the church’s sanctuary. Immediately following the service, the United Presbyterian Deacons and other UPC members prepared and hosted a Fellowship Lunch. The Hitchcock family asked that everyone share this meal and time of fellowship with them in memory of their father. More than 50 people joined the family in Fellowship Hall on the lower level of the church to share in the meal, give condolences and remembrances directly to family members and view the display of Hitchcock family photos and memorabilia.

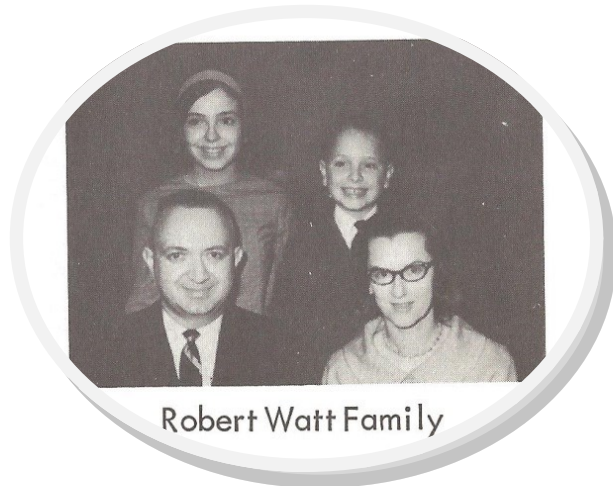

Remembering the Watt Family



It doesn't seem possible that it's been a year since we said a final goodbye to our friend Phyllis Watt. Longtime members will remember, not only Phyllis, but other members of the three generations of the Watt family who lived in Bloomington and generously gave of their time and talents to serve their church, their community, and their country. The first generation was Bob Watt's parents, Robert Earl Watt and Gladys Asdell Watt, who joined the church in 1923. Robert Earle Watt was a trustee and church treasurer, as well as chair of the building committee responsible for overseeing the building of our present church in 1952. The large wooden cross on the stair landing was donated in his memory. Gladys was a Deacon in the 1970's. She passed away in 1993.

Their son Robert (Bob) Dale Watt joined the church in 1939. He followed in his father's footsteps, taking over as chair of the building committee to oversee construction of the church addition in the 1960's. After the untimely passing of his first wife, he married Phyllis in 1965. Bob served several terms as an Elder and was our Clerk of Session from 1999 until his passing in 2006. He also had a strong interest in music, singing in our choir, and was a member of the IU Alumni Band.

Phyllis was an accomplished artist. One of her paintings can be seen in our church parlor and others grace the walls of some of our members' homes. In later years Phyllis served as a Deacon until her health would no longer allow it. Their son Carl served his country as a marine officer, serving numerous tours of duty in Iraq. The pictures above are from a church pictorial directory from around 1968. The children shown with Bob and Phyllis are their son Carl and Bob's daughter Judy from his first marriage.
