Eastside Neighborhood Association Update


October 1 – Annual Neighborhood Meeting. Mark your calendar for our potluck and neighborhood meeting, 4 to 6:00 p.m. at United Presbyterian Church at 2nd and Eastside. This is a great chance to connect with neighbors old and new and to learn about ways to get involved in the neighborhood. The ENA will provide meat and vegetarian chili; please bring a side, beverage, or dessert to share.

ADUs Ordinance: At a 7-hour meeting on Sept 6, the City Council passed an amended version of the ordinance to allow ADUs/granny flats to be built in core neighborhoods. The ordinance includes several key provisions lobbied for by the ENA and the Bryan Park and Elm Heights Neighborhoods: approval of ADU permits by the Zoning Board of Appeals, a limit of one bedroom in ADUs, a limit of 3 unrelated adults on the entire property, and a requirement that the owner of the property sign an affidavit that he/she is living either in the main house or the ADU. A big thanks to Judy Berkshire for her leadership on this issue for the ENA and the Council of Neighborhood Associations (CONA).

Assess East Side's Walkability: 2-3 volunteers are needed to give input from our neighborhood on walkability and pedestrian issues to the Monroe County Coalition for Accessibility and Mobility. Training on how to do a "walkability audit" is October 24, 1–5:30 p.m. at Bloomington Transit multipurpose room. MCCAM hopes to finalize the volunteers quickly, so please email Barbara Salisbury of MCCAM, at barbara.salisbury@att.net.

Urban Homesteading Design Project (at The Project School, grades 7/8): Have you been thinking about backyard chickens and don't know where to start? Wanted to start growing your own food but don't have the time to plan your plot? Curious about backyard composting, worm bins, or rainwater collection? Always wondered about beekeeping or food preservation? We are currently engaged in a yearlong study of food, food systems, and urban homesteading. We are looking for families who would be interested in working with our students to design, build, and install elements of an urban homestead! You and your family will set the budget and our students will work closely with you to design homesteading elements and solutions that will help your family become more self-reliant and sustainable.
