Reflections for Members and Friends of the Presbytery of Ohio Valley

Thanksgiving Day — November 25, 2021

Thirty years ago or so, on the evening before Thanksgiving, I worshipped at a United Methodist Church where my friend, K Almond, was the pastor. When it came time for the sermon, K stood up, looked at the congregation, and said, "We can choose thanksgiving. And it will change us." I cannot, for the life of me, remember anything she said after her opening words that evening. But neither can I forget her opening words that evening. Not for the life of me.

We can choose thanksgiving. And it will change us.

Sometimes it's easy to choose thanksgiving: the sight of autumn hillsides against October's bright blue sky, the sound of a baby's first laugh or the robin's first song, the warm feel of Grandma's quilt on a chilly November night, the aroma and flavor of bread fresh from the oven. Sometimes it's easy to choose thanksgiving, when our senses come alive and we revel in all good gifts around us. Sometimes choosing thanksgiving hardly feels like a choice at all; it is as natural as the next breath that fills our lungs with sweet, fresh air.

But sometimes, it feels impossible to choose thanksgiving. Sometimes the pain that envelops us or the fear that grips us or the anger that fills us numbs our senses to anything else. And yet sometimes, even in the midst of the pain or the fear or the anger, we start to notice something more: a sight or a sound or a touch or a smell or a taste, or maybe just a thought or a word or the flash of an image. Something small, just a seed.

Furrows be glad, though earth is bare,

one more seed is planted there.

Give of your strength the seed to nourish,

that in course the flower may flourish.*

Sometimes all it takes is a seed, and our gentle and courageous decision to nourish it. Thanksgiving takes root, and sprouts and grows and begins to grace us and nourish us and change us.

I don't know where you are as you read my words today. It may be that you are filled with thanksgiving. It may be that all you can do is to nourish gently the tiny seeds that you're beginning to notice. Or it may be that you can find no reason for thanksgiving. If this is the case, I encourage you not to waste a moment in self-doubt. I encourage you to trust where you are and who you are in this moment. But I encourage you, too, to take heart, and to trust that God is at work, even if you cannot see it or feel it or taste it. The seed sown in the barren earth may stay hidden for a while.


Furrows be glad, though earth is bare, one more seed is planted there...
