#### Dear Friends,

"There comes a point where we need to stop just pulling people out of the river. We need to go upstream and find out why they're falling in." Archbishop Desmond Tutu spoke these words addressing the inequities of apartheid, and they deeply resonate with our vision at MCUM to end poverty. We are pulling our neighbors out of the river by finding solutions to situational poverty and more importantly we are going upstream to find lasting solutions to economic, educational and social injustice so that they stop falling in. Through our implementation of quality programs, innovation and collaboration we are **breaking the cycle of poverty**.

The synergy of our programs at MCUM are uniquely suited to end generational poverty for the people we serve. Not only do we address our community's immediate need of food, financial assistance, and childcare, we empower this generation to be better for their children, and their children's children. We aren't just giving a family a bag of groceries to last them until pay day; we are giving them energy to care for one another. We aren't just paying someone's electric bill; we are building a foundation of financial independence. In 2022 we served 25,000 residents and anticipate even more in the years to come.

We are so appreciative of your past support and hope you will join us again this year by donating to the **Spring Into Action Campaign**, a community-wide challenge to break the cycle of poverty. This year our goal is to raise **1,000** pounds of non-perishable items to restock our food, cleaning, and hygiene pantry which will throw a life vest to someone experiencing situational poverty. We also need **\$40,000** to support our quality childcare and coaching programs that eliminate generational poverty by going upstream to address the injustices and inequities to keep future generations from falling in the river.

### Your donation to our Spring campaign will go towards our three largest annual operating costs.

- \$53,000 feeding children in Compass Early Learning Center three healthy meals and two snacks.
- \$40,000 in emergency grant funding to pay for rent, utilities, and microloans.
- \$28,000 in keeping our facilities clean and safe for the 14,580 annual visitors to the Self-Sufficiency Center and 120 children in our early learning facilities.

Together we can break the cycle and end generational poverty, for good.

# Please Help with UPC's 2023 Per Capita

The Per Capita is an annual contribution made to the Presbytery of Ohio Valley,  $\cong$  General Assembly, and Synod for the services and support they provide to UPC. The 2023 per capita is \$50.15 per member. If you are able, the per capita may be paid by check, cash or credit card. Make checks payable to UPC with 2023 per capita on the memo line. Place cash in an envelope marked per capita. Place checks and cash envelopes in the offering plate in the narthex. If donating by debit/credit card, note per capita and your name on the print out from the machine and place it in the offering plate. If you have questions, contact UPC Treasurer Andy Hill.

# Why Per Capita is Important

Per capita funds are the primary source of support for the Office of the General Assembly.

Per capita funds allow the Office of the General Assembly to support the ministry and witness of congregations and mid councils through:

- Bringing together commissioners and advisory delegates as the General Assembly
- Publishing (in multiple languages) and distribution (in multiple format) of the Book of Order, The Book of Confessions, and other General Assembly publications
- Underwriting the expenses of the Co-Moderators of the General Assembly as they
  travel across the church and around the world to interpret the work of the General
  Assembly and attend church anniversaries, presbytery meetings, retreats, and
  emenical gatherings
- Gathering church leaders from presbyteries and synods for training events
- Supporting work in the area of ordered ministry, helping all Presbyterians respond to God's call in their lives as teaching elders, ruling elders, and deacons
- Providing necessary tools to develop and administer ordination exams to seminarians preparing to become future pastors
- Maintaining Church Leadership Connection, the online system that supports the call process for pastors and congregations
- Supporting those elected to serve on permanent General Assembly committees, such
  as the Advisory Committee on the Constitution, the General Assembly
  Committee on Ecumenical and Interreligious Relations, the General Assembly
  Nominating Committee, and the General Assembly Committee on Representation
- Providing information, advice, and counsel to presbyteries and pastors whose members have immigration issues
- Supporting the Presbyterian Historical Society, ensuring that our witness to the gospel today will be preserved for future generations, just as we have learned about the history of past generations
- Providing a Presbyterian presence at ecumenical groups and gatherings in this coun try and worldwide-- extending our mission efforts and our work for peace and justice far beyond what we can do by ourselves to promote Christian unity


# UPC vocalists become part of music history!

Bloomington got the world — yes, world — premiere of the first full-scale opera about Anne Frank based on "The Diary of a Young Girl." Performances were in early March at the Indiana University Musical Arts Center.

The director was the acclaimed Crystal Manich. She believes we should not stop telling stories just because they are difficult to hear. Telling them might make them less apt to be repeated. Pulitzer Prizewinning composer Shulamit Ran created the score, Charles Kondek wrote the libretto, and IU's Arthur Fagen conducted.

The four performance world premiere was an exciting time for IU and Bloomington. Right in the middle of all that excitement were two of our own – Marielle Madeline Hug and Patrick Tervo. They were cast in the chorus, an integral part of the opera. Marielle and Patrick are half of the UPC Quartet. They were most happy to play a role in opera history.
